<u>Title:</u> War and Shifting Frontiers: Case Study of Bengal

The seminar "War and Shifting Frontiers: Case Study of Bengal" held on June 30, 2023, at Polba Mahavidyalaya, offered a deep insight into the historical and geographical dimensions of warfare in Bengal. Dr. Santanu Sengupta, Assistant Professor at Polba Mahavidyalaya, expertly delivered an examination of how warfare has shaped the shifting frontiers of Bengal over time. The program commenced with a speech by Mr. Rajesh Das outlining the seminar's objectives. This was followed by introductions and acknowledgments of the Teacher In-Charge (TIC) and the esteemed resource person. The inaugural address was delivered by Mr. NarugopalKaibarta, the respected TIC of Polba Mahavidyalaya, whose insightful remarks left a lasting impact on the audience. Subsequently, Dr. Rituparna Hajra, HOD, Department of Geography, provided an introduction to the esteemed speaker, highlighting his extensive knowledge and research background.

In Technical Session I, Dr. Santanu Sengupta took the stage and delivered his lecture on the theme of the seminar. Through a series of insightful presentations and discussions, participants gained valuable insights into the diverse historical contexts of conflict in the region, from ancient battles to colonial conquests and modern geopolitical dynamics. Dr. Sengupta's expertise and engaging delivery facilitated a nuanced exploration of the sociopolitical and economic impacts of war on Bengal's frontier regions, highlighting the enduring legacies of past conflicts on contemporary society. Attendees left the seminar with a deeper understanding of the intricate relationship between warfare, territorial boundaries, and cultural identities in Bengal, paving the way for continued scholarly inquiry into this complex subject.

Technical Session II was held for the students of Geography Department, Polba Mahavidyalaya. Semester VI students took part in this session who delivered their speech on different disastrous event. They presented their study which is part of their curriculum. The first speech was given by Semester VI student Anirban Das, who presented the study of "Mining Subsidence: Case study on Jharia& Raniganj". Second speech was given by Soumili Mukherjee and Sayani Ghosh, who presented their study on "Uttarakhand Flood 2013". The last speech was given by Shreya Ghosh and Gulsanara Begam, who had presented their study on "Assam Flood 2022". All the students represented their study in very elucidated manner.

The seminar concluded with the valedictory session, during which Mr. Rajesh Das extended a vote of thanks, expressing sincere gratitude to all participants. Undoubtedly, the seminar met its expectations.


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
Objective of the Seminar

The seminar titled "War and Shifting Frontiers: Case Study of Bengal," featuring Dr. Santanu Sengupta, Assistant Professor at Polba Mahavidyalaya, aimed to undertake a multifaceted exploration of the historical, geographical, and socio-political dimensions of warfare in Bengal. Through a meticulous examination of historical records, geographical features, and societal transformations, the seminar endeavored to unravel the complex interplay between war and shifting frontiers in the Bengal region. By focusing on case studies and empirical evidence, the seminar sought to elucidate how warfare had shaped the territorial boundaries, cultural identities, and socio-economic structures of Bengal across different epochs. Furthermore, the objective was to provide attendees with a clear understanding of legacies of past conflicts, as well as their implications for contemporary geopolitical dynamics.

Throughout the seminar, participants engaged in scholarly discussions and critical analyses of key historical events, military strategies, and geopolitical shifts that had influenced the trajectory of Bengal's frontier regions. Special emphasis was placed on exploring the role of warfare in shaping power dynamics, migration patterns, and cultural exchanges within Bengal and its neighboring regions. By fostering an interdisciplinary dialogue among historians, geographers, sociologists, and political scientists, the seminar aimed to stimulate intellectual curiosity and scholarly inquiry into the complexities of war and frontiers in the context of Bengal. Ultimately, the objective was to deepen participants' understanding of the historical forces that had shaped Bengal's geopolitical landscape, while also highlighting the relevance of such knowledge in contemporary debates surrounding territorial disputes, identity politics, and regional security concerns.

The second session the students of Geography Department of Polba Mahavidyalaya presented their study on disaster preparedness. The objective of the student seminar is to provide a platform for academic thought exchange with faculty and other students and to learn and share ideas about their study on the disaster. The Department want to encourage students to think deeply and creatively about the topic and to work together to come up with new ideas. The seminar is also a chance for students to show off their own projects and get helpful feedback from others. They presented their study on Mining Subsidence; Uttarakhand Flood 2013 and Assam Flood 2022. All the study had shown the cause of the extreme natural events and their disastrous impact on human society.





What is a Frontier?

- In the past, during the political evolutions of a state, states were separated by areas, not lines. The function of the intervening area was to prevent direct contact between the neighboring states and it was referred to as a frontier. A frontier is the political and geographical area near or beyond a boundary.
- The term came from French in the 15th century, with the meaning "borderland"—the region of a country that fronts on another country (see also marches). A frontier can also be referred to as a "front".

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- A difference has also been established in academic scholarship between Frontier and Border, the latter denoting a fixed, rigid and clear-cut form of state boundary.
- A frontier, can, thus, be defined as a geo-political area, lying beyond defined borders of a political unit into which expansion could take place.
- It is a physical and moral concept which implied looking outwards and moving outwards.

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Frontier in History

- Jos Gommans: Looked at the routes radiating from the Mughal imperial centre as its frontier, that was constantly thrusting outward and expanding. Integration of new territories therefore happened through routes of communication.
- Expansion becomes possible when the routes to frontier are well managed, the environment and ecology of the frontier is negotiated with successfully.
- Local populace and local centres of power in the frontier zone is managed.

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- Pratyay Nath: Outermost military outposts represented a frontier in early modern warfare. The control being often in flux and dependent on local allies.
- Nations States, borders and new frontiers.
- Geo political alliances and rivalries.

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


- Violent conflicts between governments or rival subnational groups hoping to form governments or reorganize territories.

- War is a contested incompatibility that concerns government & or territory where the use of armed force between two parties of which at least one is the government of a state.


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
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

















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

















Speech I: Minning Subsidence: Case Study from Jharia and Raniganj Coalfield

Abstract:

Mining-induced subsidence poses significant challenges in coal-rich regions like Jharia and Raniganj in India. This study explores the causes, effects, and mitigation strategies for subsidence in these areas. Subsidence primarily results from underground coal extraction methods, weakening overlying strata and causing ground collapse. Rapid urbanization exacerbates the impacts, leading to infrastructure damage and threats to human safety.

The consequences of subsidence are multifaceted, including structural damage, land degradation, and environmental hazards. Ground fissures, sinkholes, and altered drainage patterns disrupt daily life, transportation, and agriculture. Mitigation strategies involve technological advancements such as ground monitoring and advanced mining techniques like backfilling and roof support systems.

Regulatory frameworks are crucial for enforcing sustainable mining practices and protecting communities. Public awareness and community engagement initiatives are essential for fostering resilience and adaptive capacity. Compensation schemes and rehabilitation programs mitigate socio-economic impacts on affected populations.

eech II: Uttarakhand Flash Flood 2013

Abstract:

Early arrival of monsoon, its collision with westerlies, ensuing abnormally high precipitation, resultant fast melting of fresh snow accompanied by breach of a glacial lake, Chorabari Tal; stage was thus set for a major hydro-meteorological disaster in Uttarakhand in June 2013. With no specific warning a disaster of this magnitude was not anticipated and everyone was taken by surprise. The incidence coincided with the peak of the tourist season when pilgrims, tourists and others from across the country and abroad had gathered in the disaster- affected region in large numbers. The incidence thus resulted in a major tragedy of recent times in which human death toll surpassed 4000. The disaster was a major setback for the economy of the state to which tourism and pilgrimage contribute a major chunk. Burden on public exchequer was further exacerbated by tax waiver and assistance provided to disaster-affected population even on losses that are not generally covered by State Disaster Response Fund. Important lessons were however learnt in managing this disaster and these would go a long way in strengthening the disaster management system not only in Uttarakhand but also elsewhere.
